



## Notes from the Chair

What happened this week may not have made the national evening news, but its significance should still be trumpeted. We reached a milestone many thought would never occur: the Lyndale Reconstruction

Kickoff Meeting was held.

Some longtime ardent supporters of this undertaking, which began 14 years ago, have watched their newborn babies grow up to become teenagers! The beginning of this project closes a chapter on a significant cultural shift in how residents, businesses and government interact on transportation issues in Minneapolis. The activities leading up to the reconstruction are also a textbook example of how all these stakeholders can work together constructively.

In 1994, Minneapolis public works officials presented a proposal to residents to widen Lyndale Avenue South to four full lanes. This would mean a narrowing of its wide beautiful boulevards, the loss of many mature trees and more traffic. Four hundred residents in attendance at this public meeting let the presenters clearly know they were strongly against the city's plan.

And then a wonderful thing happened. A core set of residents went one step beyond simply saying they opposed the proposal. They created an alternative road design that would renew community connections and serve as a model for a 21st century urban transportation system. The Lyndale Avenue Task Force (LATF) was made up of residents from 10 neighborhoods between Franklin Avenue and the Crosstown. Working together, across neighborhood boundaries and through many community meetings, they accomplished their goal. In 1997, the City Council adopted the "Lyndale: A Vision" into the city's Comprehensive Master Plan.

Lyndale Avenue is a Hennepin County road. When the county received the task force's plan in 1997, officials set it aside. This was not how things were done then. When Commissioner Gail Dorfman was elected in 1999, she provided the leadership for "Lyndale: A Vision" to gain traction. In 2005, the city council adopted a preliminary layout for Lyndale between 31st Street and Minnehaha Creek. Over the next two years, the city, county, park board, neighborhood organizations and residents worked together to finalize the streetscape plan for this section of Lyndale.

How we got where we are today contributed to a change in how transportation projects are developed in Minneapolis. Now, residents and businesses expect to have a voice in the development of the public space we call roads. Transportation officials have come to value the input of these stakeholders. This project also demonstrates that it is not only possible for many organizations and individuals to work together as partners; it is beneficial to do so. Community activities best done are done best by the many.
